


## Upper Left Hand Corner

**Measure M: Locally controlled funding to Restore Services that have been cut since 2011:**

**Financial Accountability**

>>This funding is exclusively to be used for Sonoma County Libraries.

**How much is it?** It is a Sales Tax of 1/8 of 1 cent, or \$.00125, or 12.5 cents per \$100, for a period of 10 years.

**How will it be used?**

>Restore Monday hours & evening & weekend hours

>Maintain programs that support education & services for all ages

>Provide access to computers & the Internet

>Acquire new technology to keep our services current

>Extend library services to underserved communities

>Maintain & enhance library collections & facilities

>Ensure adequate staffing at all Sonoma County Libraries
